Student Learning Assessment

<u>Portfolios</u> are a requirement of completing certain degree programs at Duke Divinity School (Doctor Ministry (DMin), Master of Theology (ThM), Master of Theological Studies (MTS), Master of Divinity (MDV), and Master of Arts (in Christian Practice) (MA). Students in these programs will need to complete the Portfolio Review before becoming eligible to graduate.

Portfolios are shaped around and help assess progress toward degree-specific student learning outcomes (SLOs) and goals. Compiling and writing portfolio documents and discussing them with an advisor provide opportunities for students to reflect on their learning and degree goals. Portfolios also allow faculty, staff, and administrators to hear directly from students about their experience.
